### The Cut

Onekama's own, award-winning author, John Wemlinger is currently writing his 5th novel, titled The Cut.

It is the story of Alvin Price and Lydia Cockrum, who literally bump into one another in Manistee during the summer of 1870 and it is love at first sight. But few romances are without difficulties and in this case, Alvin is a farmer, and Lydia's father is a renowned railroad engineer, thus aligned with the powerful lumber industry in northwest Michigan. The two groups are at odds over a dam which drives a sawmill for one, while flooding the others' land. However, two force majeures will change not only the trajectory of their love affair, but the history of the entire area. The novel, a work of historical fiction commemorates the 150th anniversary of the narrow tenth of a mile-long ditch at the southwest corner of Portage Lake dug by a group of disgruntled farmers in May of 1871. Today, that "ditch" is the magnificent channel connecting Portage Lake to Lake Michigan.

The citizens group preparing the celebration of Onekama's 150th anniversary asked the author to write "a story about that time." The Cut is that story and will be available for the various celebratory gather-

ings this summer. As you are making your summertime plans, please join us in Onekama for a summer of celebration and look for your copy of The Cut to be released May, 2021.





#### ONEKAMA, MICHIGAN'S "OneKama OneFifty" CELEBRATION

150 years ago, Onekama, Michigan had its official start. The wildly fascinating story of "The Cut" is an iconic and life-altering event that shaped Onekama. The local homesteaders, tired of conflict with the Porter Lumber Milling Company whose dam at Portage Creek flooded farmland, took matters literally into their own hands. Illegally hand digging a small trench from Lake Michigan to Portage Lake to lower the lake to its original depth, the homesteaders created a fantastic spectacle! On the night of May 14, 1871 when the trench was completed, the water rushed out taking with it woods and sand and creating a channel 500 feet wide and 12 feet deep. This channel brought great opportunity for the homesteaders and the mill and remains to this day an integral part of the Onekama community.

Coincidently just a week before, the Postmaster General appointed a postmaster to an office at the newly named village of "Onekama". 2021 is the sesquicentennial anniversary of these two events.

Through a series of activities and events based on Onekama's 150 year anniversary, OneKama OneFifty will celebrate the Portage Lake Channel and the village of Onekama.

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

## **BROWSING THE SEED CATALOGS IN JANUARY**

Is there anything more interesting and provocative than browsing the seed and plant catalogs that arrive in the mail (physical or electronic) every January? Maybe not for everyone, but I recently found some new and interesting plants for your consideration and enjoyment. Here are a few favorites.

Laura Bush Blend Petunias are an old-fashioned petunia, bred for heat tolerance and disease resistance, making it a low-maintenance beauty. Named after the former First Lady of Texas, Laura Bush, this variety maintains classic petunia fragrance. It is a spreading plant with a mix of magenta, purple, pink, and white blooms that attracts pollinators. You can sow Laura Bush in containers for a lush patio garden—even in the high heat of summer! Botanical Interests nursery (at botanicalintersts.com) sells this variety of seeds for under \$2.





Botanical Interests also has a new variety of poppies that caught my eye. It is called *Amazing Grey Corn Poppy*. The beauty of 'Amazing Grey' is beyond compare. Crepepaper like blooms unfurl into single and half-double blooms, each unique. Bred over 18 years from a single bloom in the Mother of Pearl poppy blend, the breeder isolated the purple-grey flowers, although you may see an occasional burgundy bloom. A practically care-free annual and a pollinator favorite, these poppies reseed making them ideal for naturalized areas. It was a 2018 Fleuroselect Novelty award winner and is drought tolerant and deer resistant. Check

it out online at botanicalinterests.com where you can also request a paper catalog.

So, while we wait our turn in line to receive the COVID-19 vaccine, let's dream and plan about the amazing gardens we will have this year!

# Summary of the Onekama Consolidate School meeting, 12/14/2020

COMMUNICATIONS: Discussion took place regarding concerns about specials not being offered to elementary students during remote learning and visiting of classrooms during the online learning. Hagen will visit when she returns to the office. Discussion regarding one parents' concern regarding online learning. Hagen did communicate with the parent and will continue to do the best we can to educate all students. Continuation of communication was a consistent topic.

ITEMS FOR INFORMATION/DISCUSSION: Extended COVID-19 Learning Plan - Onekama will continue to educate through online learning through January 4, 2021 for K-12 students. Currently, teachers who can teach from home are to teach from home. We are providing transportation to several special education students. If a student's teacher is teaching from home, we have other staff on campus and support staff who can oversee those students who come to school for their education.

Two-Way Communication Update - As required by the state to keep track of two way communication for online learners, Hagen indicated that we have a 95% rate which she is pleased with (91% last month). She did need to ask the sheriff to make an outreach visit to families whose students are failing to check in during their scheduled learning time.

NWEA, SAT, PSAT Update: (charts mailed to trustees on 12/9) - Hagen updated the trustees. There was lengthy discussion regarding the results citing the baseline scores and their accuracy. We closed in March; the 3rd grade reading law will be difficult to enforce but we plan to have interventions to help the students as they move to 4th grade. Hagen provided some statistics on the test scores for the PSAT and SAT and reminded everyone that students may retake the SAT.

February Training Dates (February 6th) - Koon reminded trustees of the training date and that it will be a face to face training. Please plan for the entire day beginning at 9am (or possibly 8am). We received a grant to cover 50% of the expenses.

Survey Results (OnLine Learning Platform) -- Hagen spent time reviewing the recent survey to help harness what our teaching staff need to help secure their

success. Hagen will continue to monitor requests for assistance.

FUTURE MEETING -- January 11, 2021 - 7:00 pm (in the Media Center) Regular Board Meeting - Organizational Meeting.

OTHER COMMENTS FROM the PUBLIC, AD-MINISTRATION AND BOARD -- Tim Klenow was acknowledged for all his work in making sure our students and families have food during remote learning. Hagen indicated that we did have our giving tree this year, but it was somewhat different but we were able to deliver to our families by using the school bus. Hagen also updated the board on the internet hotspot boxes that have been issued, transportation for special education children, the virtual library established by our aide Olivia Nichols, the extra work being done by other aides Cheyanne Bartynski, Betsy Neph, Janice McCraner and Bridget Ware. Koon thanked Steve Brooks and Sam Catanese for their service as a Board Member as their term expires December 31, 2020. The celebration next year of the 100 years of opening the channel will take place during Onekama Days and the township is looking for a junior or senior to represent the school. Hagen will see if someone is willing.

ITEMS FOR January MEETING -- COVID-19 Learning Plan update, 2 way communication update, updates if any on the previous survey.

ADJOURNMENT - It was moved by Wisniski and supported by Dye to adjourn at 7:42 pm. Motion carried unanimously.

# Summary of Onckama Township Board Meeting 10/6/2020

COUNTY COMMISSIONERS: Jeff Dontz reported that the Prosecutor's office will not be handling the Child Support matters anymore. That will be handled with the Friend of the Court. Dontz extended his "Thank you" to the Township for signing up with the County Planning Department for its services. The County has spent \$16,000 on (2) negative pressure cells for the jail. Computers have been purchased so that equipment may be kept up-to-date. A contract was signed with Lisa Sagala. A Public Hearing was held for the 2021 budget cycle. A 3-year contract was signed with Canteen Food Service. The Council on Aging Millage is up and on the ballot. It will primarily be used for Meals-on-Wheels increase and will go into effect in 2022.

RECYCLE: Sarah Archer reported that the Fair-ground Board has agreed to have the recycle bins over at their site. The study is complete that was done over the 11 day period. Approximately 160 people were talked to. Onekama captures 37% of the entire County's recycling.

FIRE/RESCUE: Report written by Captain Kaitlin Kubiskey. September reported 15 EMS Runs (1 to Brown Twp), 6 Fire Runs (1 MA to B.L.), 1 Fire/EMS, 1 EMS Mtg, 1 Maintenance Mtg, 1 Fire Mtg/Training. Fire coverage was provided at the Demo Derby. Hopefully all of the final bids will be received and a decision will be presented to the Township Board for a new Brush Truck at the November Township Board Meeting.

ROADS: Johnson sent out letters to the residents on Joseph Road per instructions at September's Board Meeting. Meister will get a bid on graveling that portion of the road.

ASSESSOR: Report received from Ginny Martz. The State Tax Commission requested an export for our current pre and sales data. That export was completed and sent to the Tax Management and Associates on Sept 8. Tax Management is doing the audit of the Principal Residence Exemptions.

PARKS & REC: Report given by Chairperson Rich Lapinski via phone. PLM is working on invasives at North Point Park. Bird activity will be going on with the Audubon Society. There will be an event with disabled veterans on Saturday, October 10th. Beach Sweep is complete by the Garden Club at Langlund Park. There is a meeting next week regarding the Kayak Launch and drawings are being reviewed.

INVASIVE SPECIES/WATERSHED: Update given by Mary Reed. Surveying is complete around the lake for the year. Watershed update was printed. 3-years worth of sample data has been collected. The Water Shed retreat was the end of September and had discussions with the LRBOI to see where possible money is available.

## ONEKAMA TOWNSHIP PARKS and REC COMMITTEE SUMMARY of OCTOBER 15. 2020 MINUTES

VILLAGE OF ONEKAMA: Report given by Andrea Arthur. Next Village Council Meeting has been scheduled for October 21, 2020. There are open seats for the Village Council inclusive of the Village President and 2 council members. 6 dead trees will be removed from the Village Park with consideration for planting new trees in the Spring of 2021.

ONEKAMA SCHOOLS: No report given by Gary Madden, absent. There will be a "Trunk & Treat" at the Onekama Schools parking lot scheduled for Sunday October 18, 2020 from 1 to 3:00pm. Various local organizations participating. Will follow social distancing guidelines.

WATERSHED: Report given by Mary Reed. Retreat was held September 22, 2020. Reviewed community survey with about 400 responses', reviewed 6 goals and objectives and tasks for 2020-2021, and continue to work with the District 10 Health Dept. on lake water quality surveys with a focus on the 2 areas of e-coli concerns.

PARKS FIVE YEAR PLAN: Report given by Leann Burger. Plan has been updated for all parks but Langland Beach. Langland Beach plan will be updated at a later date due to further discussions.

NORTH POINT PARK: Report given by Mary Reed. PLM has completed their scope of invasive species plant removals. Paul Mueller reported on the recently held walk in the park for a group of Manistee ISD Special Needs Students hosted by Michelle Ervin, Paul Mueller and Mary Reed. Very positive feedback from the participants and the ISD staff. May plan a similar event for the Spring 2021. Paul also reported on the recently held "Stroll & Roll" event conducted at the parks as part of the Onekama Days Lite Activities. Again positive feedback about park and the event. Requested feedback from participants on possible improvements to the park for improved ADA features. The Manistee News Advocate newspaper continues to feature news articles about our activities conducted at the park.

LANGLAND PARK: Report given by Bob Blackmore & Rich Lapinski. Vault toilet will serviced and then closed during the second week of November 2020. Parking lot striping will be deferred to the spring of 2021. Parking lot will not be snow plowed other than the Manistee County Road Commission plows using the parking lot as a turnaround for plowing of Portage Point Drive. High lake water levels, numerous storms and extensive wave action has contributed to continued beach erosion and driftwood accumulation. A beach trash clean-up was conducted the Onekama Garden Club. Al Taylor and Rich Lapinski to follow-up with Beckett & Raedar, Project Manager for 2016 Park Improvements Project, to review extensive washout at the end of the ADA access boardwalk. Will develop options plan for long term fix.

GLEN PARK: Report given by Rich Lapinski. The Michigan DNR Passport Grant Application preliminary score was received by the Twp and Gosling-Czubak. Rich Lapinski and Dallas Wertz of Gosling-Czubak added additional information to our application that will be used to improve and determine our final score for grant consideration. The final grant application score and grant award winners will be announced by the second week of December 2020. Will continue to address the removal of any fallen trees across the hiking paths to allow year round useage of the park.

KAYAK LAUNCH: Report by Al Taylor. An amendment was made by the TWP to extend the project application process through December 2020 which has now been approved by the State. After a Sate review of the latest project information submission is complete and approved, Al will work with Spicer Engineering to seek out 3 competitive bids for purchase and installation of the kayak launch at the DNR Park. Anticipate a 2021 installation. Will need to request a project extension into 2021.

### TOWNSHIP PUBLIC ROAD ENDS: No report

PLA: Report by Al Taylor. Fall Festival Lite was successfully held with events including a Pet Parade in the Village Park, a Roll & Stroll at North Point Park, Scarecrow Displays in the Village underway and a Trunk or Treat October 18, 2020 at the Onekama Schools parking lot. Plans are underway to conduct the Annual Christmas Tree Event at the Farr Center Park and install Christmas Lights on the Village utility poles. PLA Board and Committees will continue to plan for conducting the traditional events for 2021; Onekama Days, Fall Festival, Christmas in Onekama, Concerts in the Park, Petunia Parade and Fireworks. Contingen-

cy plans will also be developed due to the uncertainty of the Covid-19 Virus pandemic.

150th ONEKAMA CELEBRATION: Report by Al Taylor. The "Cut 150" Organizing Committee will have meeting October 16.

MANISTEE COUNTY-WIDE PARKS & REC COMMISSION: Report by Mary Reed. A new

updated extensive county-wide proposed trails plan has been posted. There have been no meetings.

PARKS & REC BUDGET: Report by Rich Lapinski. Expenditures continue within budget. Budget may be subject to a reduction based on reduced TWP revenue sharing \$.

OPEN DISCUSSIONS: Friends of the Park – Discussion about ways to provide alternative funding for the Onekama Twp Parks & Rec Committee 5 year plans and the Twp.'s continued maintenance, improvements and operations. Covid -19 pandemic will introduce Onekama Twp budget challenges, thus possibly reducing the current and future budgets. This alternate funding would provide funding to supplement TWP funding as budgets are challenged.

2 options were discussed:

Form a 501-C3 non-profit organization to raise money for parks maintenance, operations and improvements – not tied to TWP. This would be the basis for a stand alone "Friends of the Parks" organization to supplement TWP funding.

Reopen our account with the Manistee County Community Foundation to place funds that are raised via donations for disbursement as required for park maintenance, operations and improvements – TWP approval require for disbursements?

#### What Is The Watershed Plan?

A community-driven effort, work began in 2006 to develop the Portage Lake Watershed Forever Plan. Over 50 individuals, organizations, agencies, and businesses signed the PLWF Partnership Agreement; in 2008 the plan was approved by the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality. It has five specific goals:

- 1 PUBLIC HEALTH To ensure that water is free of pathogens and/or toxic chemicals;
- 2 AQUATIC ECOSYSTEM To protect the integrity of essential habitats;
- Water-Based Recreation To protect and enhance recreational opportunities;
- Natural & Cultural Assets To invest in land-based resources that preserve, enhance and promote the watershed;
- Local Management & Implementation **Institutions** - To establish mechanism that provide sustained local leadership and community engagement to implement the plan.

#### What You Can Do To Help...

- Plant native vegetation along streams, waterfront and in yards. Use safe shoreline landscaping practices.
- Use compost and other natural soil enhancers in gardens and lawns. Avoid using fertilizers and pesticides especially along shorelines.
- Understand the role that wetlands play in keeping the watershed viable. Protect them and contribute to efforts to do so.
- Dispose of chemicals, paints, oils and other toxic substances safely and according to local ordinances.
- Join and contribute to the Watershed Council. Participate in strengthening the organization to assure the wise use and enjoyment of the watershed for now and for future generations.

#### **Facts About Our Watershed**

The Portage Lake Watershed covers 24.6 square miles and includes parts of Manistee, Bear Lake, Brown and Onekama Townships as well as the village of Onekama.

Portage Lake has a surface area of 2,116 acres — 13.4% of the total area of the watershed. It is a natural lake formed by glaciers and fed by 22 streams. In two areas, its maximum is up to 60 feet with an average depth of 19 feet.





#### Why Do Watersheds Matter?

Everyone lives in a watershed. We depend on the water that flows though watersheds for everything from drinking water to farming to recreation. Consequently, it is important that we understand how what we do has a significant impact:

- Rainwater that flows across paved roads and parking lots before reaching a stream is likely to warm up and pick up heavy metals and oil from the pavement. Warm or polluted run-off will degrade habitat for fish and insects in Portage Lake and its feeder streams.
- Animal waste and bacteria from yards or livestock can wash downstream to the lake and other areas in the watershed and lead to beach closures and other health concerns.
- Fertilizers used on lawns and farms can also run off into nearby streams and storm drains. The nutrients in fertilizers can trigger algae blooms in the lake and reduce oxygen levels for fish and other marine life.
- Conserving wetlands and natural vegetation along the lake and streams helps filter some of the run-off and protects water quality throughout the watershed.
