Petunia Parade Much More than Beautification



Petunia Parade members would like to believe that it was Onekama’s magnificent 25th Anniversary petunia display last summer that inspired Manistee residents to resurrect this longstanding tradition in their own community. For those of you who haven’t heard, the Manistee News Advocate reported on March 5, 2019, that Manistee’s Blossom Boulevard along M-31 is being relaunched in 2019 after a three-year long hiatus.

The reason it stopped according to the article was “previous committee members retired after many years and there was nobody to step in.” Fortunately, to date, Onekama volunteer committee members, planters, weeders, waterers, financial supporters and sponsors have dug in for the long haul.

“We are always seeking new volunteers,” explained Committee Co-Chair, Mary Jo McElroy. “Whether it’s students from Onekama Consolidated Schools, new people moving into the community, or summer residents, we welcome one and all to join in the fun.”

Of course, it takes plenty of volunteers in all these capacities to make the annual blaze of color happen. There will be about 3,500 purple, hot pink and silver tidal wave petunias that need to make their way into the soil lining the north side of Onekama’s Main Street on May 22.

Preparation for the actual planting is overseen by a twelve-member committee under the auspices of the Portage Lake Association.

“Pleasanton Valley Greenhouses (long-standing vendor for the parade) takes great care in providing us with healthy plants that will prosper in this location,” said Committee Member, Debby Major. “And, Larsen Landscaping’s in-kind donation of roto-tilling, raking, soil analysis, and weed control makes planting much easier.”

SHOE COLLECTION DRIVE FOR PORTAGER PRIDE PACKS

Would you ever think that your gently worn, used and new shoes could help Onekama kids who need food, school supplies, or life essentials? Well they can and here's how. The Portage Lake Association is conducting a fundraiser where there is nothing to buy or sell. All we need is your support and your gently worn, used and new shoes. We are looking for community members to help support us by agreeing to collect and donate pairs of gently worn, used and new shoes in the next few months. Here's how you do it: Start in your family's closets and gather pairs of shoes that you've out grown, out of style, or out of season. Ask your neighbors, family, and co-workers to do the same. Slippers, boots, and flip flops are OK too.

How does the shoe drive work? The PLA will earn funds based on the total weight of pairs of gently worn, used and new shoes collected. Our partner, Funds2Orgs, will issue a check for the collected shoes. Anyone can help by volunteering to collect shoes or by donating gently worn, used and new shoes at EZ Market, Snyder's Shoes in Manistee or Ludington, or Onekama Consolidated Schools (event entrance near fitness center or Principal's office under the clock).

All donated shoes will then be redistributed throughout the Funds2Orgs network of micro-enterprise (small business) partners. By donating gently worn, used and new shoes to the Portage Lake Association, the shoes will be given a second chance and make a difference in people's lives here and around the world.

Where will the money go? All net proceeds will be given to the Portager Pride Pack program at Onekama Consolidated Schools. That program is organized and managed by the Middle School Student Council under the guidance of teacher Naomi Kolehmainen. Needy students and families receive school supplies, food, and necessities (such as toothpaste and tooth brushes, soap, shampoo, or personal hygiene items).

Official dates for the Shoe Drive are May 1 through June 30. In the meanwhile, if you are spring cleaning or decluttering, please set aside any gently worn, new or used shoes (footwear of any type – flip flops, boots, slippers are fine). Onekama Students Named Essay Contest Winners

Three eighth grade students from Onekama Consolidated Schools have been named local winners in the fiftieth annual America and Me Essay Contest, sponsored by Farm Bureau Insurance.

The three students are Grace Servinski, first; Johnathan DeVoll, second; and Hanaa Frally, third. All three received award certificates for their achievement.

Grace Servinski's first place essay now advances to the state level competition, from which the top ten essays in Michigan will be selected. The top ten statewide winners, who will be announced in April, will each receive a plaque, a medallion and a cash award of \$2000. In addition, the top ten essayists will be honored at a banquet in Lansing, meet with Michigan's top governmental leaders, and be the featured guests at a Lansing Lugnuts minor league baseball game dedicated in their honor.

Several thousand eighth grade students from nearly 400 Michigan schools participated in the 2018-2019 contest. The topic of the contest was "My Personal Michigan Hero."

Started in 1968 and open to all Michigan eighth grade students, the contest encourages Michigan youth to explore the greatness of America and its people. As a sponsor of the contest, Farm Bureau Insurance has earned 11 national awards from the Freedom Foundation at Valley Forge.

Outdoor Activity Guide to Onekama

North Point Park. Paved walking and biking trails. Some rustic dirt and gravel trails also. Several picnic areas. Public portable toilet on site. Pet friendly; please use leash and clean up after your pet. Take Portage Point Road west to Seymour Road, turn left, parking lot at entrance to park. Historic 1930 restored lighthouse structure is ½ block from North Point Park at the DNR Launch Ramp. Soon to have a handicapped-accessible kayak launch installed at DNR ramp on Andy's Point near North Point Park.

Glen Park. Historical spring, scenic creek, walking path and stairs. Take Main Street west, turn right onto Fourth Avenue. Park on left side near top of hill.

Onekama Village Park. Sandy public beach, public restrooms, picnic tables, sheltered pavilion, playground, and boat launch. Home of the PLA-sponsored 'Concerts in the Park' every Monday night at 7pm for 8 weeks in the summer. Nature Conservancy Dune Climb. Public access to large sand dune; strenuous climb without a designated trail. Accessible from Ivanhoe Road (off Portage Point Road). Signs mark the property.

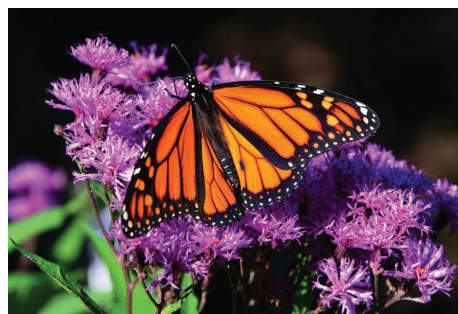

Various and Sundry . . .

While it may appear that it's been a quiet winter watershed-wise, there has been a lot going on under (or in spite of) the snow, ice, wind and cold:

Special Assessment District (SAD)

The township recently passed a resolution to continue the Portage Lake Management Program (PLM) program to manage the invasive species in and around Portage Lake. This annual maintenance program is funded through a Special Assessment District (SAD) and continually monitors Portage Lake to keep exotic plants under control.

We need to ensure that surveys and monitoring continues in order to stay on top of any changes in the plant community in Portage

Lake. Plant and algae production can vary seasonally and the program will respond with required

treatments based on up to date surveys.

A special assessment is not a tax. Rather, a special assessment is a specific levy designed to recover the costs of improvements that confer local and peculiar benefits upon property within a defined area.

Public hearings and community education programs will be held to review the results of the last ten years that the SAD has been in effect and discussion about management plans for the next decade. Be sure to check the township's website for the schedule (<https://www.onekama.info/>)

The purpose of PLWF . . . is to engage all interests in the community, and to ensure the wise use and enjoyment of the Portage Lake watershed for present and future generations.

SAW* Grant Update

You may recall that, in 2018, the township applied for and received a \$221,000 grant on behalf of the watershed to develop an storm water management plan is to find out where stormwater runoff occurs in the township and what's in it. This is of significance as runoff creates flooding, introduces pollution and sedimentation into the system and can impact water quality.

The Spicer Group, which is managing the project, has made good progress gathering data and developing procedure and expected the whole project to take three years to complete. Right now we are working on a "Public Education Plan" to make the community aware of sources of stormwater pollution so we can reduce or prevent it.

However, one of the things you can do to help right now is to check nearby culverts or ditches after a rain to see if the water coming out smells funny, is full of sediment, or otherwise looks suspicious.

If it is, report it to the township or a member of the watershed.

Monarch Butterflies Threatened

From our colleagues at the *Manistee Conservation District* comes news that Monarch butterflies are being threatened by the spread of two deadly invasive plants in parts of Northern Michigan. Black Swallow-wort and Pale Swallow-wort are not only toxic, but have been known to confuse female monarchs into thinking they are laying their eggs in safe milkweed plants. Unfortunately, larvae from eggs laid in the invasive Swallow-wort plants will die.

If you should spot this invasive, the Northwest Michigan Invasive Species Network urges you to report it. Swallow-worts are “Early Detection, Rapid Response” species in northwest Michigan; very few populations are established, so it’s important to get to work on any new populations right away.

How do you get rid of them? Hand-pulling and cutting works when combined with herbicide. Digging up the vine may be an option for small patches, whereas herbicide application would be appropriate for larger infestations. Stream monitoring

If slogging through sodden underbrush along a slippery stream bed sounds like fun, or tweezing out wriggly invertebrates from mucky, leaf and twig strewn cold water is your idea of a swell time, then you are not alone. Volunteers from across the county have pulled on their waders and sallied forth to monitor all manner of county streams. And, perhaps not surprisingly, it’s fun and utterly fascinating. There is a universe of teeming life just beneath the water; finding, identifying and cataloguing what’s there (a.k.a. *benthic macroinvertebrate communi-*

tebrate communities) helps determine the health of the stream. At the same time, volunteers are also checking stream

conditions and watershed characteristics to try to identify any problems that could cause problems in the future.

REGULAR MEETING MARCH 5, 2019**

COUNTY COMMISSIONER: Jaquish reported that the DHD will have a Hearing in Cadillac regarding the Point of Sale Inspection on real estate for wells and septics. The first draft of the Manistee County Medical Care Facility is complete regarding the renovation and addition for approximately \$22 million. A feasibility study is to be complete in April.

MRA: Nick Doyle, Director of the MRA, presented the annual contract to provide sports and activities for county wide individuals. Onekama had 44 residents participating in MRA activities in 2018.

FIRE/RESCUE: February recorded 14 EMS runs, 1 M.A. to Manistee Township, 4 Fire Runs, 1 Meeting, and 2 Meeting/Trainings. A joint training with Bear Lake Township was done with the UTVs. The Thermal Imaging Camera and SCBA Bottles that were purchased from the Revenue Sharing Grant have come in. Training to come. The annual inspection of the SCBAs is complete. One needed a part replaced, otherwise, all passed.

ROADS: Motion by Johnson, Second by Wisniski to approve the Agreement for Erdman Road 2019 Hot Mix Asphalt (HMA) Wedging, Chip Sealing, and Fog Sealing. Road Commission Match \$50,000, Township Match \$50,000, with a Township Advance of \$12,500.00.

ASSESSOR: The organizational meeting for the March Board is today.

The 2019 database for both real and personal property was submitted to Equalization on February 21, with the notices mailed on February 22. There are a lot of big assessment increases this year. This is due to the change in the new pricing manual, State Tax Commission required. The Board of Review is being held March 11 and March 13.

Forms L-4037, State Tax Commission Assessment Roll Certification and Forms L-4201, Assessment Roll Changes Worksheets were signed March 4, the legal date required by the State Tax Commission. All of the Deeds, PREs, Recinds, and Transfer Affidavits have been processed. The new tax roll descriptions for the new splits and combinations have been entered into the computer. We did receive a proposed opinion and judgement from the Michigan Tax Tribunal.

PARKS & REC: The Committee welcomes Al Reitman as a new member of the group. New brochures have been printed. Discussions continue regarding the vault at Langland Park. The Kayak Launch is in progress.

COMMISSION minutes
January 17, 2019**

Simons reported that the Invasive Species Committee will be meeting with the lake manager next week to review the final report for 2018.

English handed out an article, from the Michigan Outdoor News, in which the author suggested that the Brandon Road Lock and Dam, in Chicago, should be filled with dirt to prevent the Asian Carp migration into the Great Lakes. Simons reported that in a follow-up article it was suggested that railroad tracks or road be installed on this fill so that cargo could be unloaded on one side and reloaded on another vessel on the other.

Burger reported that there was a report of an ice fisherman going through the ice, last weekend, and the fire rescue was deployed. No other info was available.

Brooks reported that the work on the channel halted in the 3rd week of December. The South side is complete except for a custom corner that has to be fabricated for the SE corner.

Blue reported that the Michigan Port Collaborative has scheduled a meeting on April 18, 2019 to discuss the template for the Economic Sustainability of the 22 ports that completed the study. Onekama is one of these ports. Invited to this meeting are all Legislatures, heads for sources of funding, and representatives of all 22 ports. The topic will be the use of the template in regards to future funding for these ports.

Mrozinski reported that a work group will gather at the Light Structure, at the DNR site on Andy's Point, for a painting bee in the spring. A discussion concerning a request to have a light installed at the east corner of the North wall of the channel followed. It was decided that no light would be required. Further discussion concerned the installation of life rings and safety lights alone both sides of the channel. It was decided to investigate the feasibility of doing this.

The lights will be solar powered and the life rings will have chips in them so that they may be found if for any reason they are missing.

Next meeting is scheduled for March 21, 2019
